- 1. Tips for Improv Singers

- 2. What Rhymes?
 - a. A word and itself: Cat and Cat
 - b. A word and a "rhyming" word:

 - d. A word and a combination of words or compound word: Cat and *Baseball Bat*
 - e. A word and a slant rhyme: Cat and Hot
 - f. A word and a wraparound: Cat and Attaching.

- 3. Ways to Share Songs
 - a. Lead Singer and Backup Singers
 - b. Couplets
 - c. Every other line
 - d. In one voice

- 4. Song Structure: Sample Formulas
 - a. Tagline: Verse Verse Verse Ending

 - c. Chorus Verse Chorus Verse Chorus
 - d. Counterpoint

- 5. Rhyme Schemes
 - a. ABCB* recommended, only rhyme once, lots of famous songs use it
 - b. AABB
 - c. ABAB
 - d. AAAA
- 6. Homework: Critical Listening
 - a. Identify parts of songs: intro, verse, chorus, bridge, tag etc. Listen for music changes and cues that let you know where you are in the song
 - b. Listen to different genres and styles of music. Scan the radio
 - c. Listen to what you like about a song
 - d. Pay attention to how much repetition there is in a song
 - e. Listen for choruses you like to sing along with
 - f. Listen to the word choice, sentence structure, and content of the lyrics
 - g. Listen to how many different notes there are in the melodies
- 7. Homework: Rhyming
 - a. When you are walking around, point and say word that rhymes with what you're pointing at
 - b. Have rhyming conversations
 - c. Play around with a rhyming dictionary—you'd be surprised what words have lots of rhymes
 - d. Try 1,2, 3, and 4 syllable rhymes
 - e. Practice a singing rhyming game on your own: Beastie Rap, etc.
- 8. Homework: Sing Along
 - a. Sing along to your favorite songs. Try to imitate the singer's voice.
 - b. Make up new words for familiar melodies
 - c. Harmonize with familiar melodies
 - d. Sing your everyday conversations to your roommates and cats.



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
